





TIPS/INFO FOR GOING TO COLLEGE

- Try to get college credit during HS
- Apply for College Foundation Scholarships
 - Many colleges offer scholarships for diversity, undocumented status, etc.
 - Dedicated funding for minority students
 - Application fees (admission, housing, etc.) can be waived
- Colleges are becoming more aware of undocumented students and their needs
- Educate parents/students on college prep and transfer credits
- Technical Colleges/Universities DO enroll undocumented students
- Students/Parents do not have to give Social Security Numbers
 - Not required for admission
 - Not required for on campus employment
 - Not required for Foundation Scholarships
 - IS required for FAFSA (student only)

SSN is on the application but not required

Social Security Number (3): Federal law allows the UW System to request and use your Social Security Number (SSN). While you are not legally required to provide your SSN on this form, you are strongly encouraged to do so. You will be required to provide your SSN when you apply for financial aid or educational tax benefits. If you provide your SSN, it will be used and disclosed only as described on page 7 of this form.

COLLEGE TIPS CONTINUED

- If student reveals their undocumented status to ANY STAFF MEMBER on campus, they will direct students to the right resources. (Find someone to trust and tell them).
- Students are encouraged to self identify to be matched with resources



WINONA STATE UNIVERSITY OFFERING

The H.O.P.E. Academy is a ten-day summer residential program for male and female high school students in 9th-12th grade. The purpose of the Academy is to provide *underrepresented* and *underserved* students with a life-changing opportunity to experience real college life by engaging them in college-level courses and workshops to develop & explore their leadership skills.

HOPE ACADEMY - high school students come to campus for 1 week during summer

- college courses
- cultural identity workshops
- Arcadia High School is going to offer scholarships for students to attend (\$50)

COLLEGE SERVICES BEYOND EDUCATION

- **ALL** Health Services become available to any student on campus with tuition
 - Physical
 - Mental Health
- Tutoring
- Career Center
- Multicultural Center
- Financial Aid Offices
- Student Organization Participation
 - Athletics (competitive and intramurals)
 - Student Clubs
- On campus employment
 - Resident Assistant free room and board, small stipend

HIGH SCHOOL FACULTY

- Educate Faculty on undocumented students
 - understand demographics (i.e. recent student moves)
 - Students who immigrate recently with parents and all are undocumented
 - Students who immigrated recently to reunite with family (siblings, parents, extended family)
 - Students who immigrated at a very early age with parents and all are undocumented.
- Seek local scholarship opportunities
- Develop an information/resource sheet with college application procedures and scholarship information. Disseminate to all school staff.
- Professional Development Opportunities

FOR STUDENTS

- Create Safe Zones
- Emphasize that undocumented students can attend college
- Disseminate scholarship information for undocumented students
- School Clubs
 - Dreamers Club

- Tell a trusted person
- Advisories ELP Levels 1 and 2 are with a Spanish speaking Advisor (all 4 years)

PARENTS & STUDENTS

- Talk about paying for college EARLY!
- Don't assume a technical college is the only option
- Keep a four year plan in mind
- More scholarships available for freshmen vs. transfer students
- Talk about costs early on and have a plan B if plan A is not affordable
- Discuss option of attending college part-time vs. full-time
- Explain payment plans
- Develop outside scholarship opportunities
