However, rural communities have rich histories of resourcefulness, ingenuity, familism, and community unity that represent cultural assets with which to face the difficulties they are experiencing. School counselors, who are charged to challenge inequities (ASCA, 2018), are powerfully positioned to uplift rural communities. In this session, we explore the ways rural school counselors may draw from rural cultural wealth (Crumb et al., 2022) to resist the ongoing impacts of abandonment uniquely experienced by rural students, families, and communities. Students learn social emotional competencies and practice good character and resiliency skills. Individual progress is monitored through rubric assessments.
